Letter From President/CEO



As we embark on our 25th anniversary, it's hard to believe we started this journey of helping cancer survivors realize their dream of a college education a quarter century ago. That first \$500 scholarship paved the way for more than 1,100 scholarships and over \$2.5 million in giving since we started. The impact we have made is remarkable.

Cancer can devastate a family. The destruction is not only physical and emotional. It can be financial as well. Families use every last resource to fight the disease. Life savings, retirement plans and college funds are drained by medications, operations and procedures often not covered by insurance. What parent wouldn't exhaust every means possible to keep their child alive?

Over the years, we've been fortunate to be able to share the message of Cancer for College around the country. In 2017 awarded \$280K in scholarships to 63 cancer survivors. In 2018, that number is going to swell to \$500K in celebration of our anniversary year. We've come a long way since the early days, but we have so much farther to go. Even with our growth, we are only able to help a fraction of survivors who seek our assistance.

None of this would be possible without the support and dedication of our board, partners and the donors. Without these important people, we would not have the opportunity to make such a lasting impact on the lives of these amazing cancer survivors.

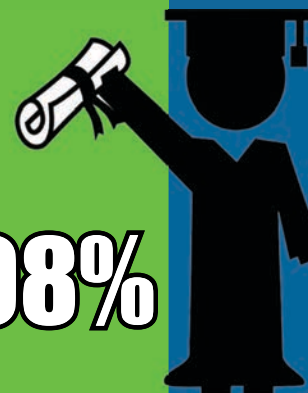


BENEFITS OF A COLLEGE DEGREE

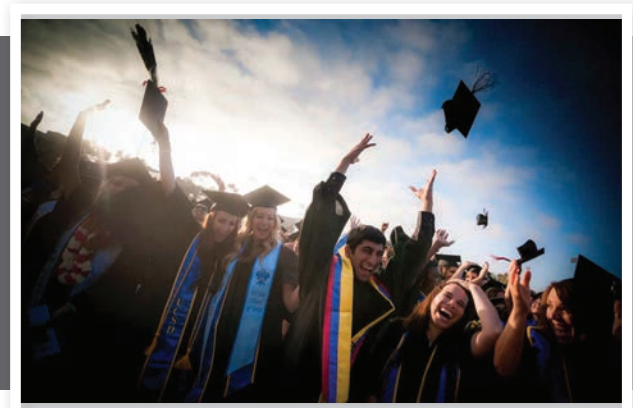

Policy

Cancer for College grants scholarships to cancer survivors who are enrolled in an accredited college, university or trade school.



Scholarship Procedure

Since 1993, Cancer for College (a registered 501 (c) 3 charitable foundation) has provided hope and inspiration to cancer survivors in the form of college scholarships. Scholarship application period runs from November 1 through January 31. Scholarships are awarded in July. Awards outside the regular award period are considered on a case-by-case basis.

Applicants are not discriminated against based on sex, race or religious belief. California applicants and applicants attending Southern California colleges will receive first consideration for perpetual scholarships which are awarded to the highest scoring incoming freshman. All remaining applicants will be eligible for other one-time awards. All awards are valued at \$5,000. Scholarship recipients must maintain full-time enrollment at his/her stated university. Failure to maintain full-time enrollment or transfer from a 4-year university to a community college may result in loss of scholarship funds. Scholarship recipients experiencing health-related issues that force them to leave school may request a one-time extension of their scholarship, not to exceed one school year. Recipients exceeding this time will forgo their scholarship, but may reapply when ready to return to school and will receive first consideration.

ITEMS YOU WILL NEED TO KNOW OR HAVE AVAILABLE TO SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETE THE SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION

1. The first two pages of the most recent tax return for:

* If you are under 25 and claiming to be independent, you will need to provide your parents returns to show that they do not claim you.

- Your parents' most current tax return if they file jointly
- Your parents' most current individual return if they file separately
- Your personal most current tax return

If you do not file a tax return, you must upload proof of any income such as SSI, W-2, Snap Benefits or other written documentation

2. Letter of Good Standing from the University you are attending

3. Academic Transcripts (High School, College or Combination depending on your year in school)

4. Confirmation of Diagnosis Letter (Must be completed on medical letterhead by your oncologist, primary care physician or nurse)

* You can upload a letter you currently have, or request a letter from your doctor directly through the application system.

5. Two Letters of Recommendation from two people outside your immediate family.

6. Total Cost of Attendance (This is a number published by your school or university, This includes tuition, room & board, books, etc.)

*This is the annual cost to attend. Not the cost for 4 years of attendance.

All required items including transcripts, letters of recommendation, etc can be requested directly through the online application.

SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

The scholarship committee is comprised of staff, volunteers, past scholarship recipients and the founders of the charity.

All applications are graded on a scoring rubric.

Points are allocated based on financial need, letters of recommendation and GPA with particular areas being weighted more heavily.

The scholarship committee gathers to read the top essays in a group setting over several weeks. Essays are graded by averaging the scores of the committee. A total of five committee members score each application.

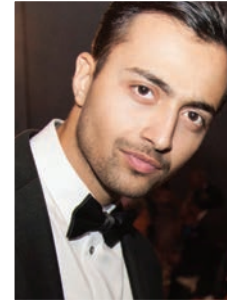


MARIA AGUILAR

Maria was in foster care from age 4-17. She had foster parents who were drug addicts and others who abused her physically, emotionally and sexually. She's endured a life that few can even imagine. While undergoing harsh treatments and taking a heavy load of classes, the university threatened to pull her grants as she struggled to maintain a full schedule. Despite it all, Maria continues to persevere as she looks forward to graduation in the spring after which she plans to participate in medical research. Maria had the remainder of her college debt wiped out by CFC.

Meet our friend Bahador. He's a survivor of Ewing's Sarcoma. The disease had metastasized to his lungs and right femur, forcing doctors to remove a rib to take out the tumor. He was given a 5% chance at survival.

His battle with the disease caused him to miss his senior year of high school. The side effects of treatment have caused cognitive issues that make school much more difficult for him. Despite the challenges, Bahador feels that his life was spared for a reason. His mission beyond earning his degree is to help other survivors overcome and thrive in a life beyond cancer.

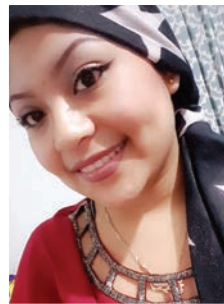

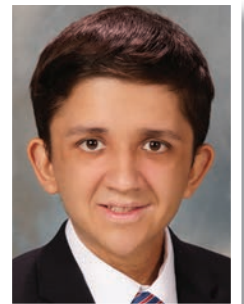


FRANK THE TANK MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

to successfully entering the industry. The scholarship recipients who participated enjoyed a very special day.

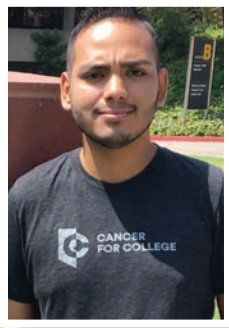

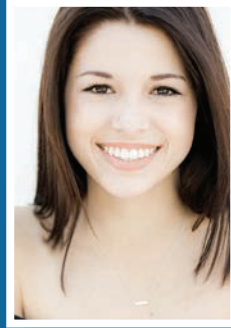
