In 2024, we launched our Bright Futures campaign with the goal of growing our program endowment by \$8 million over the next three years. COLLEGE IS EXPENSIVE

College education can exceed \$20K annually at public institutions and can surpass \$50K at private schools. This creates financial burdens that can impact a survivor for years.



MAKE A DIFFERENCE

39% of our scholars are pursuing a career in healthcare and 34% of our female scholars are pursuing a career in the STEM field!

MORE HELP NEEDED

CFC will award \$1M in scholarships for the third straight year, but there were hundreds of applicants that we could not help.



CANCERIS EXPENSIVE

The cost of medical care and treatment in the first year after diagnosis can range from \$42K to over \$100K on average.





FIRST TIME

47 of our current scholars are first generation college students and need additional support in navigating college.



LOST **WAGES**

36% of families dealing with cancer lose 40% or more of their annual household income.

94% of parents caring for a child with cancer make work-related sacrifices including quitting jobs. This places incredible stress on the financial health of the family.

Cancer Survivor is Flying into the Future

At 18, Raphael Meleji had big dreams. He was a high school senior in Kenya, planning to become a pilot and earn his degree at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in Florida. He envisioned funding his education as a student-athlete, playing on the university's soccer team. But in early 2019, his life took an unexpected turn.

While preparing for exams, Raphael discovered a lump near his left testicle. It turned out to be rhabdomyosarcoma, a rare cancer. Two weeks later, he flew to India for treatment, as there were no treatment options available in Kenya.

The journey was rough. Raphael had surgery, chemotherapy, and lost mobility in his leg. Over the next two years, he endured 45 chemotherapy sessions but remained positive.

After two years, Raphael was declared cancer-free. He immediately reset his focus on becoming an aviator.

Now, three years later, Raphael hopes his story inspires other children facing cancer, showing them that life continues after illness. He is proof that dreams can survive the harshest challenges.

Overcoming Cancer to Live on Her Own Terms

Aimee De Luna was a typical high school senior balancing an advanced curriculum with applying to colleges. A routine checkup turned into a rush trip to the hospital and a heartbreaking diagnosis of acute lymphoblastic leukemia.

Aimee faced intense treatment, months of isolation, hair loss, and physical struggles. She was unable to walk for months. Despite the side effects, she finished her senior year, graduated, and received a standing ovation at her ceremony. Unfortunately, her cancer journey didn't end there. Financial struggles grew as her family juggled fulltime work and mounting medical bills.

Writing became Aimee's escape. She started an Instagram account to share her journey, connecting with others in similar situations. Her story resonated with many, offering strength and inspiration.

Now in remission, Aimee continues to face the lifelong effects of cancer treatment but remains determined to achieve her goals. She refuses to let cancer define her future, fighting to complete her education and live life on her terms.





FUNDRAISING EVENT HIGHLIGHTS

At Cancer for College, events are the lifeblood of our fundraising efforts. They fuel our programming and have allowed us to grow tremendously over the last several years.

For the fourth time in five years, CFC partnered with Jersey Mike's Subs for the Month of Giving. In March, select stores throughout Southern California, Alabama and Massachusetts banded together and raised \$2 million for the cause. CFC did secret scholarship reveals at multiple Jersey Mike's across the country. Over the lifetime of our relationship with Jersey Mike's, the company has raised over \$7M to support CFC's efforts in the cancer community.

The 31st Annual Classy Golf Classic is the fundraiser that started it all for CFC. It was played at the historic Coronado Golf Course and was once again sold out. The event featured multiple scholars and raised \$200K.

The Holiday Jam hosted by Will Ferrell returned to the Music Box in San Diego with a very special performance from Dogstar featuring Keanu Reeves.

Other staple events held in 2024 included One Classy Night - Carolina, the 12th annual Tin Cup One Club Challenge in San Diego, the 25th Annual Cherry Hawk Day at the Del Mar Race Track and the Ultimate DJ House Party. Each event is a celebration of determination our scholars exhibit as they work toward their dream of a life beyond cancer.
